AFFI Salutes Senate for Expanding School Snack Program

McLean, VA – American Frozen Food Institute (AFFI) Interim President Joseph Clayton today expressed support for bipartisan legislation introduced in the U.S. State that will enable elementary schools to serve a full range of healthy fruit and vegetable snacks.

Introduced by Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wisc.) and co-sponsored by Sens. Joe Donnelly (D-Ind.), Dan Coats (R-Ind.) and Tammy Baldwin (D-Wisc.), the "Fruit and Vegetable Access for Children Act" (S. 2243) expands the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Fruit and Vegetable Program to allow schools to serve all forms of fruit and vegetables as snacks, including frozen. Currently the program restricts schools to serving only raw produce.

"AFFI commends Sens. Johnson, Donnelly, Coats and Baldwin for leading efforts to expand USDA's Fruit and Vegetable Program, which will help enhance childhood nutrition and promote healthy eating habits. This expansion will give schools year-round access to the widest possible variety of healthy and affordable fruits and vegetables in all forms, including frozen.

"As confirmed by <u>Frozen Food Foundation</u>-commissioned nutritional studies conducted by the <u>Universities of Georgia</u> (UGA) and <u>California-Davis</u> (UC Davis), frozen fruits and vegetables are as rich in nutrients, and often more so, than freshstored produce.

"We look forward to working with school nutritionists and other stakeholders to ensure this expanded program is approved by Congress and signed into law by President Obama, which will help USDA meet its own *Dietary Guidelines for Americans* that encourage the consumption of frozen fruits and vegetables."
